Dear Parents, Carers, Families and Students  
Jesmond Senior Campus has had a great start to Term 2 continues to be a very productive and busy term. We have had a number of fantastic student successes and experiences.

All of our student had the opportunity to attend the Newcastle and Lake Macquarie Career Expo at the Newcastle racecourse. Exhibitors included representatives from national universities, group training organisations, the defence force and TAFE. Students were able to talk to employers and educational providers to gain advice and information about their future career and educational aspirations. As part of our focus of future pathways, ex-students from Callaghan College Jesmond campus were invited to talk to current students about their own experiences and journeys.

Our Careers and Transition team are currently interviewing our year 12 students, in order to assist them transitioning from school to work or further education. University early applications are now open see Career team in the Hive if you require assistance.

Two past students from our Callaghan Alumni have also been to New York to participate in the "Change the World Conference 2022". As we celebrate reconciliation week and commemorate National Sorry day, our Aboriginal students and the support team have participated in the "Rising from the Embers" festival at the University of Newcastle. This year's reconciliation week theme is "Be brave, Make Change". Preparations and organisation are well underway for a fantastic NAIDOC assembly in week 10. We hope our primary schools in the Callaghan Education Pathway are able to join us for this event.

Students participating in the college sports teams, individual sports and extra-curricula activities continue to make great inroads.

The College football team had a good season winning many of their games, but graciously losing to Glendale in competition for semi-finals.

Our chess team continue to win, beating Maitland Christian College in the latest bout.

The Callaghan College Open Boys Rugby league team won the under 18s University Shield and the under 18s Girls team narrowly missed out on winning the Katrina Fanning premiership by just 4 points. Our student will be competing in Zone athletics this Monday, supported by the Sports Coaching students who will provide adjudication and administration support at the event.

# Faculty Updates

## Maths

Both Year 11 and 12 have been completing Assessments over the last few weeks.

Year 12's recent assessment task was held in the Auditorium - to have students well-prepared for their exams in October/November.

Year 11 are in the process of completing Assignments and Presentations with several impressive presentations already submitted. We hope to be able to showcase several of the submissions during Parent Teacher night at the end of this term.

Year 12 students are quickly reaching the end of their courses, so we have started several tutorial lessons, concentrating on past HSC questions (and answers).

Mathematics Standard 2 is held on Wednesday mornings and Mathematics Advanced Tuesday afternoon. Early in Term 3 we also have some whole day tutorial sessions for Mathematics Extension 1 and 2.

## English

Year 11 Standard have been investigating the contemporary possibilities of storytelling this term. Students have been exploring the power of stories as a mechanism to promote meaningful change. Our students engaged with a variety of texts that shed light on the issues of Indigenous rights in Australia, both historically and today.

To enrich their understanding, Professor John Maynard, Emeritus Professor of Indigenous Education and Research at the University of Newcastle, shared his perspectives on the history of Indigenous activism in Australia. In sharing his own family's story, Prof Maynard brought an insightful level of relevance and significance to our students' learning and helped deepen their appreciation of the concepts studied in class and the importance of advocating for equality.

## Science

Science at Callaghan College Jesmond have had a huge term, full of indepth studies, practical activities and assessment tasks.

The Year 12 Chemistry class travelled to Orica at Kooragang Island to explore the manufacture of ammonia after finishing their research based around the Bosch-Haber process. Students were given a lecture by one of Orica's senior chemical engineers and then taken on a tour to see the plant in action.

Students in Year 12 are now working towards completing their last units of work before the HSC Trial begin in Week 5 of Term 3. Students should be increasing their independent study and looking to do past papers in preparation for this assessment period.

## PDHPE

Year 11 PDHPE students covered First Aid, with Year 12 gaining a deeper understanding of the factors that affect performance of athletes. Community and Family Studies students have been focusing on Individuals and Groups, with Year 12 having a particular focus on the roles of Parents and Carers.

SLR embraced a range of sports and fitness both within the school and community, with small group sessions delivered by Chin Up Fitness and One Life Consulting.

Year 12 have completed Racket Sports, including Squash and Tennis excursions. Sport Coaching students planned and delivered a range of events, including tabloid events for Waratah West students, staff wellbeing and a Year 7 Mixed Sports Gala. Year 12 students are programming and coaching staff and students in strength and conditioning sessions. They have also completed a range of work placements, and have been recognised for their professionalism.

## HSIE

We hear from our students that they enjoy the creative tasks that encourage active education opportunities. In Term 2, the HSIE faculty has once again adopted this approach and embraced learning through 'doing' across many of our courses.

Our Ancient and Modern History students have been taking part in student directed historical investigations. Geography students are working on their individual Senior Projects, which involve fieldwork on an aspect of the local community, and Business Studies students are developing business plans to set up and market their individual products. Business Services and Retail students are actively training in the Newcastle community by working in several businesses to complete their workplace hours.

## Special Ed

On 1 June, our Support Unit had the pleasure of hosting an afternoon tea for Love On the Spectrum stars, Jimmy and Sharnae Beresford. Jimmy graduated from Jesmond's Support Unit in 2016 and they gave up their time to talk to our students about life (and love) beyond Jesmond. We also interviewed them, with the story being featured in our film project later this term.

They provided wonderful insights into working life and the pathways they have followed since leaving school as well as the professional successes they have both had to date. Students then shared a wonderful afternoon tea that they had prepared as part of their Food Tech program. It was a huge success and they are looking forward to visiting again later this year.

# Faculty Updates

## Industrial Arts / Computing

The student's major projects are progressing well. Many students have sourced Australian hardwoods and softwood varieties for their furniture projects. Each student is working from a plan they produced using CAD SketchUp software. Reiley has a Tasmanian Oak Bedside Table; Callum, a floating Bed with a spotted gum parquetry bedhead, Isaiah, a Coastal Coffee Table, and Napoleon, a Round Timber Coffee Table.

The Australian UAV Service in partnership with SheMaps ran a workshop with 12 students who developed skills in block programming for autonomous flights using Tello drones. They also explored how UAVs are used for other business, like mapping, 3D modelling, and surveying.

## Home Economics

Hospitality across all courses are experiencing real world restaurant scenarios as part of their learning.

Base skills which have been developed through the early stages of the course are put to the test as we prepare and serve food to hospitality industry standard. These scenarios will assist students in preparing for Year 11 workplacements which will be experienced next term.

Year 12 Food Technology students are completing the final stages in the development of their own food product and Textiles and Design students are approaching the completion of their major works.

Exploring Early childhood continue to experience real world situations with weekly visits to Heaton Pre-School.

## CAPA

Year 12 dance and drama students are preparing for HSC Practical Examinations in Term 3.

Year 11 dance students are working on Core Composition assessment task. Preliminary Drama students are preparing for performance assessments, and several have been accepted to State Drama Camp later in the term. Several students across music, music industry, drama, entertainment industry, visual design and photography are rehearsing dialogue, musical pieces, set design, light design and audio operations for the upcoming production of Grease.

We have a number of students in Starstruck including 4 in the Dance Ensemble be in 'Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious' & 'Wonderwall', and Sophie G, Rebecca H, Indea F, and Emily C have singing roles, with Zach W in the puppet troupe.

Year 12 Visual Arts are working on their Body of Works to be submitted in September. Year 11 Visual Arts are building on their skills and beginning their digital artworks based on Modernism. Year 11 Photography students will be filming Film Noir projects at Maitland Gaol in Week 8.



## Lights, camera, action!


Callaghan's musical productions are back on...

# Callaghan Alumni in New York at Change the World Conference

"I attended a model United Nations Conference in New York City from 23 March 2022 – 26 March 2022. The organisation Change the World hosts this event annually, bringing together thousands of students from across the globe to discuss current political issues.

In the lead up to the Conference you complete online modules and attend a virtual event that allows you to get accustomed to the actual event once in New York. As a participant you are given a country to represent (not necessarily the country you come from). You are then given a United Nations Committee, whether that be UNICEF, General Assembly, UNCTAD, WHO etc. to represent your country under. I was part of the UNICEF committee, representing El Salvador. The topic of discussion for our committee was how to reverse the devastating impacts of COVID-19 on children and young peoples.

During the conference you discuss this topic in relation to your allocated country. Students would come up to the podium and speak and by the end of it we would form ourselves into groups and create a United Nations Working Paper, this is a preliminary document that stimulate discussion and critical comment on the topic in question.

The Change the World Model United Nations is a great way to learn about the process of the United Nations but furthermore, it allows you to liaise and work with other students from around the globe! This is not only a great opportunity to network but also to make friends.

During the couple of days that I was in New York City I came out of the Conference with new friends that have offered to be my tour guide if I ever visit their home country. What better way to end what had been a very fantastic trip!"

The trip was a truly life-changing experience and the memories made in New York City shall stick with me forever. We were lucky enough to be in the presence of former US President, Bill Clinton speaking alongside footballers Narco Tardelli and Andriy Shevchenko.

I look forward to furthering my own career in politics on the national and international stage for the bettering of our world. It is truly fantastic to see the future of our tiny planet in the hands of such talented, capable and sensible people."
